PG&E Update

Steve Nash and Kelly O'Haire, the PG&E Ad Hoc members have had calls and meetings with PG&E to improve our communications, concerns, and power infrastructure issues and to avoid lengthy outages.

We learned that a "sustained" outage is one lasting more than 8 minutes and these have decreased in BMK and that BMK, because of number of residents here are on a priority restoration if we lose power.

There are birds flying into the power lines and vegetation that causes some of the outages.

Reporting: BMK residents are asked to report power issues when you hear strange cracking etc. to PG&E. Do not just post it on social media because they do not see it there.

Vegetation: BMK Vegetation is one of the biggest problem areas in Marin County, due to the number of palm trees planted directly under or near the power lines and the flying fronds blowing into the power lines.

Raised Power Boxes on BMK Blvd.:

PG&E offered to walk the area and inspect the raised power boxes, which are required to be at sidewalk level.

Viewing: We conducted a driving tour with PG&E representatives and many of the PG&E representatives also drove the area themselves. After the last meeting, we toured the area of the most "transformer explosions," which is at the area of the corner of BMK Blvd. and Montego Key. Explosions are not explosions; they are the fuses design to keep the infrastructure protected.

Upgrades: PG&E just upgraded the inbound lines with a safety shutdown that will help decrease the power outages.

Future: PG&E is willing to put a meter inside and outside of 2-3 homes that are experiencing flickering of lights and small outages. We need volunteer homes for this project to locate the source of the problem. The reports of "flickering lights" may or may not be a service issue. The issue may be inside the residence. PG&E is willing to put a reader on a few volunteer homes. Please contact Steve Nash if you are interested in being a volunteer.



As some of you in the North Lagoon have already noticed, we have four areas of bubbles in the no wake zone by the community center as a pilot program to get the lagoon cleaner and improve water quality. The south lagoon has three areas of diffusers in three different lagoons which is why the water is clearer in those areas.

If this pilot program proves to work and improves water quality, more diffusers will be placed in other areas of the north lagoon to improve water quality all the way around. Due to the early bloom of algae this year, one algae treatment has already been performed to both lagoons one month ahead of schedule and will continue to be treated each month until October. Muck Biotics and Summer Slam are the Algae control we have been using which is a non toxic algae treatment that has no effects on humans or animals. We appreciate your patience and continued support as we try to get these lagoons as clean and healthy as possible.

Update on BMKCSD Projects and Funding

I want to take a moment to update you on recent developments and initiatives that will shape the future of our community for years to come. These changes will improve our infrastructure and enhance our waterways and parks.

First, I am thrilled to announce that our community passed a significant milestone by approving a 20-year parcel tax of \$150 a month (\$1,800 per year increasing 2.5% each year). This tax will play a critical role in funding essential updates and enhancements of our marine infrastructure. It is very heartening to see that nearly 80% of our residents supported this initiative, demonstrating our collective commitment to the sustainability and prosperity of Bel Marin Keys.

The immediate objectives for this parcel tax is to identify specific projects and prioritize what ones require our immediate attention and funding. The upgrade of our navigational locks, improvement of our levees and flood control measures and sustaining our watershed, and creek health and navigability along with long-term and nature based ecological based restoration and improvements. Our goals include working with neighboring partners, developing collective and financial support in these endeavors. We have joined the Novato Creek Baylands Strategy Work Group, lead by James Mueller with the San Francisco Estuary Partnership.

As we face the challenges of climate change and rising sea levels, it is imperative that we take proactive steps to safeguard our community against increasing risks.

By investing in these infrastructure upgrades, we are ensuring the long-term resilience and safety of the Bel Marin Keys Community.

To ensure transparency and inclusivity, we are reaching out to our community members to serve on oversight committees. These committees will play a vital role in informing the Board about the specific projects and funding requirements that are deemed valuable and necessary. We value your insight, expertise, and opinion. Your participation will be instrumental in guiding our decision-making process. Together, we can ensure that our resources are allocated effectively, and our communities needs are met. It is critical that all areas of our community are represented so that we can best serve the needs and benefit our entire community. Member representation should include residents from the HOA's, those living on Novato Creek and both South and North Lagoon residents.

We are asking residents to join Measure G, Measure D and the Parks and Open Space committees. We now have committee members identified and appreciate their wiliness to serve their community.

Our first task will be to interview and hire a marine engineering company to access our marine infrastructure and make recommendations in determining our needs and funding for improvements. The oversight committees and board will also review the engineer's advice. This will include assessing design and permitting needs for specified projects.

We have also engaged a grant writer, a retired engineer from the Marin County Flood Control District with experience and connections relating to our watershed. The grant writer will assist us in vetting potential partners and identifying grants where we have the greatest chance of obtaining.


On April 24, 2024, I attended the NBWA (North Bay Watershed Association) Conference at Sonoma State University. The conference provided real insights into available grants and contacts for future partners. One of the presenters even used BMK as an example in their presentation of areas in need of flood control and watershed improvements. We hope that our success will be included in this follow-up presentation.

We also have three Board seats coming up for election in November. If you think that you have skills that would help our Board better serve the entire community, please run for an open seat on the board. If you think that you have skills in identifying issues with our marine infrastructure, please consider serving the community as an advocate so that we may **KEEP BMK THRIVING**.

In closing, I want to express my gratitude to each and every one of you.

CSD management needs to step it up to maintain the same level of dedication and work quality. Board Members are working hard. And upon completion of the Board's appointment of members to the advertised *ad hoc* committees,

meetings will be scheduled to get the committees actively in gear.

Recently, the Marine Engineering Committee started the process of interviewing Marin Engineers, Contractors, and General Managers.

Current members of the MEC include Vince Lattanzio, Steve Nash, Terry Friesen, Brian Clark. The MEC has taken the first visiting firms on a boat tour to the North Lock, Gates and Sea Wall. While visiting the sites, the MEC shares our needs and goals with the engineering experts. As of the time of writing this message, the firms are preparing bids and proposals for the initial assessment work.

One of the first issues to be addressed is the subject-matter experts' plan, is to evaluate our Locks, Gates, Sea Wall and connecting tube; assess hydraulics, electrical, and the mechanical systems; gauge the integrity of the steel and concrete; address any other issues that we need to consider. These bids will include a recommendation of options pursuant to their subject expertise. The MEC will be reviewing Bids, Proposals and Plans for the projects. Identifying Project priorities. Analyzing proposed costs and expenditures. And agendizing the item for Board discussion and public input. Please email with any questions, comments or ideas in this regard.

Regardless of different backgrounds and incomes, the water brings everyone together at

BMK. Life here is full of friends and social activities. Volunteering for the four main events—4th of July, Santa by Sea, Light Parade, Concert on the Keys, and the Egg Hunt—is the best way to engage with the community.

"Community is everything. It's the support system that makes living here so enriching. Whether it's working together on volunteer projects, celebrating milestones, or just lending a hand when someone needs it, the sense of belonging is profound. I've made lifelong friends here, and we all look out for one another."

Jahnine, an active member of the Yacht Club and Women's Club, feels integral to the BMK community. She encourages all neighbors to get involved by volunteering and participating in community events.

We also enjoy trips through San Pablo Bay and into San Francisco Bay with larger boats with the yacht club offering reciprocity with other clubs around the world. Beautification Committee By Cheryl Furst

OK so the key words are pops of color! The beautification team has been working hard to add pops of color to the environment. We would love to show it now but since we are planting smaller plants we are going to have to wait! So far, we have planted almost 200 yellow daffodil bulbs, 30 dwarf blue iris which were planted by the front signs as you drive into the keys. We planted some in front of the marquee and we planted 25 Dark Purple Knight Butterfly Bushes between the palm trees as you enter. We will have another plant with some Purple Salvia. We are buying the plants mostly from a grower and receiving a great deal. I personally donated \$1,000.00! We are going to have another plant when the grower calls saying the plants are in, which should be pretty soon. If interested, we meet every second Tuesday of the month. Anyone who is interested in helping or just want to say hi!! Come join us.

We meet at 6:30pm at the club house and occasionally we meet at a restaurant.

The fragrant, arching clusters of Butterfly Bush are irresistible to hummingbirds and butterflies. Really a shrub, plants are best treated like perennials and pruned back hard each spring, to maintain a compact, bushy habit. This selection has long wands of dark purple flowers, on a tall clump. Excellent for cutting. Removing faded flower heads will encourage plants to continue blooming. Drought and heat tolerant once established.

The beautification Team has also been discussing the habitat for the birds on the islands. Now is the time when the birds are breeding and to give them the best chance at being successful breeding results, we need to keep a distance from them and stay away from the islands.

I frequently see people kayaking close to the islands or boating and we all want to see what's going on there, but sometimes getting close scares the birds. Please keep this in mind when your having fun in our beautiful environment.

Recently I had the pleasure of having a representative from the Audubon Society come join us to tour our environment

It was such a treat!! We saw a few egrets nesting. This is a Big DEAL!! These birds don't' nest everywhere but they are here!!! We also saw a rare bird sitting on a wire at the south lock a Western Kingbird. This bird has just been discovered coming to our area from Arizona. If you see people walking around with telescope in camouflage they are watching for this bird.

I have invited the Audubon to come and talk to the residents about our environment. So they will be joining us at the Beautification Meeting on July 9th 2024, 6:30pm, at the CSD. If interested, please come. Also, the Audubon society is a great organization and they come out for free. Donations welcome. Thanks for reading.

Our Water Quality- It's Everyone's Responsibility:

WHAT YOU CAN DO ABOUT ALGAE...


- Reduce Your Lawns If you have a lawn, consider removing it or keep it small & avoid using pesticides and fertilizers. Always use zero phosphorus fertilizers and try natural alternatives to traditional pesticides and fertilizers. Check the second number on the package formula, 10—0—10, for example, means zero phosphate. Consider this one pound of phosphorous in runoff can result in 500 pounds of algae growth!
- Use Native Plants To Landscape- Landscaping with native plants improves our local ecosystem. Native plants are adapted to our environment and climate and are tolerant of both drought and tough winters. This drought tolerance means no need for excessive watering and less runoff. Native plants are also adapted to our soils and, thus, don't need fertilizers or pesticides. This means less maintenance for you. Native plants have deeper root systems (which create more air space in the soil), so they accommodate water infiltration, which, in turn, reduces runoff. Finally, native plants also provide better habitat for wildlife. The CSD maintains a list of good native plants for BMK.
- Don't Over Water- Excess irrigation water diverted into streets and directly into lagoons negatively impact our water quality. Irrigation timers need to be checked regularly and corrected after power outages. It is important to run your irrigation system during the early morning hours when less water is lost to evaporation (cooler temperatures) and the wind doesn't blow as hard. (2:00-3:00 AM is best) Watering your plants deeply and less frequently will encourage deep root growth and drought tolerance (i.e. deep watering 3 times per week). Lawns only need an average of an inch of water per week. Installing a rain sensor detects measurable rainfall and turns off the automatic irrigation valves to prevent over watering.
- Conserve Water- Plant a rain garden, use a rain barrel to catch water from your roof, consider using permeable pavement in your driveway runoff that stays on your property will not wash contaminants into the lagoons and creek.
- Use A Car Wash- Soaps used to wash cars & boats ALL contain nutrients and chemical
 pollutants that are harmful to our lagoons and creek, promoting algae blooms and harming
 organisms living in it. If you must, direct wash water into planted areas to be absorbed and
 filtered by planting, but better to use a car wash that recycles water.
- Only Water Down The Storm Drains- Keep litter, pet waste, dirt and debris out of street gutters and storm drains. Regularly clean leaves from the street, sidewalks and gutters in front of your house so they can't be washed away with the rain. Leaves, grass and pet waste decompose they produce nutrients that promote algae growth. Store landscaping and construction materials like soil and mulch out of the streets.
- Clean Up Safely- Anything spilled in the streets, driveways or dock areas such as gasoline, brake fluid, oil, grease, and antifreeze must be cleaned & immobilized immediately. Use kitty litter as an absorbent for oil. Rags can be used for brake fluid, antifreeze or grease. Pick up all pet waste! NEVER hose anything you would not like to drink or swim in into the streets or lagoons.
- Follow Boating Speed Regulations- Go slow in the no wake zones and designated areas that are narrower. Don't promote large wakes anywhere. Big wakes erode shorelines putting sediment into the lagoons. Yep, you guessed it- sediment from erosion promotes algae growth as well as damages docks and property.
- Please Don't Feed The Wildlife- This includes those cute little baby ducks and geese! Local
 waterfowl and fish have plenty of natural food that is better and healthier for them. Over feeding
 our wild animals produces excess waste products high in nutrients that promote algae growth in
 addition to public health issues and bacterial contamination.
- Educate Your Gardener/ Landscaper- Request that they do not blow leaves or grass clippings into
 lagoons or storm drains. When possible, mulch or compost your grass clippings. Mulching your
 grass reduces the need for fertilizer because, as the grass clippings break down, nutrients are
 released into your lawn, not the lagoon. Less fertilizer on your lawn, means less nutrients in the
 water and yes, less algae! Don't cut your grass lower than 3 inches in the summer. Slightly longer
 grass will stay greener, reducing the need for watering and less watering means less runoff.
- Dispose of Hazardous Waste Properly- This is even more important for a waterfront community like BMK. Do not pour old gasoline onto the street or wash paint brushes at the end of your driveway. Where do these pollutants end up? In our lagoons and creek. Properly dispose of ALL household hazardous wastes. Whether gasoline, paint, pesticides, antifreeze, motor oil, or the like, dispose of them at the county waste site. Their effect on our waters can be devastating!




